MEMBERSHIP FEES

Our Club membership fees run from 1st March of one year to 29th February the following year. This was made aware to our members in the February, March and April newsletters.

Obviously the newsletters are being mailed out but members are not taking the time to read them. Somebody suggested adding a red spot to the newsletter when membership fees are due. But if you are not reading the newsletter, adding a red spot really won't help. In fact we have tried that before and it doesn't work.

Members already receive two extra newsletters after the end of February. If you are slow in paying your fees, you will still receive March and April newsletters before your mailing address is removed. Your name and address is still on our register, but will be listed as unfinancial **until** your fees are paid.

If you are 'on the ball' and you know that you have paid your fees and have missed out getting your newsletter, we ask that you to please get in touch with the Membership Secretary as soon as you can. Let us know your receipt number and we will check our records for you.

Sales Tickets and Plant Entry

Members are asked to please carefully read the following especially if you are one of those who exhibit and sell plants at our shows.

If you exhibit plants you are then able to sell plants. For every plant you exhibit, the Club allows you ten plants to sell, with a limit of 100 sales (this makes 10 plus exhibits) which is more than reasonable. Everyone has to abide by the same rules, and no one gets special treatment.

The aim of having a show is to make the display really spectacular for both our club members and the general public. Because we try to cover the costs of renting the hall for the weekend we allow you to sell plants, with the club taking 15% commission to help cover expenses incurred over the weekend. The tickets we provide for our sales plants cost approx 6c each, so please only take the quantity that you know you are able to use at one show. Price your plants to the nearest dollar, **don't add 50c** to the price.

Sales tickets, entry forms and schedule will be available at the meeting before each show. In the case of the Winter show this year, tickets will have been brought along to the June meeting and also the July meeting. This will allow you to fill in your tickets at home making it easier for all concerned. Fill out your sales sheet starting at the lowest number, keeping them in the right numerical order down the sheet. Members who cannot get along to the meetings are asked to phone early to make arrangements for posting them.

The **sales area closes at 4.30pm Sunday**. We ask members who have had plants in the sales area to come promptly at that time to remove any sales tickets (not before) that are on their unsold plants and check them off with members who have the sales sheets before taking your plants outside.

Show plant entries start at 1.30pm and close at 6.30pm on the Friday night of each show. We will accommodate you if you notify us earlier that you will be running late. We will then hold up proceedings until the judging starts which is between 7 and 7.30pm, but you **MUST** notify us before hand.

The show **closes on the Sunday at 5pm**. Please be there on time to pick up your display plants at that time (not before), as it is difficult trying to sweep and vacuum around plants, that owners have not picked up on time.

Most importantly, please put the best plants you have out in the display, not something to fill a gap so you can have sales tickets.

Social Function

The bus trip on Sunday the 19th of August has been fully booked.

However we are pleased to advise that another bus trip has been arranged for our club members. It will be on Sunday the 28th of October. The bus will be traveling to the following destinations:-

1. Castle Creek Orchid Nursery
2. Ardmona Fruits
3. A local winery

The cost of this trip will be \$25. The Bus will leave our Maribyrnong Club at 8am and will be returning at 5pm. Please note the reason for the earlier departure is due to the fact we are traveling to Shepparton, which is a further distance than other bus trips. Members wishing to attend can put their name down for the trip at the next meeting.

Members attending Bus trips are reminded to wear their name tags. In fact it will be helpful if you could wear them on all bus trips in future.

Those wishing to gain an insight into this creative past time will be impressed by the many tips you will pick up at these demonstrations.

Novice Growers: What NOT To Do!

Here are a few tips from Jan Robinson, member of the Sutherland Shire Orchid Society. This valuable information will be appreciated by all orchid growers:

1. Do not take the cymbidiums you just bought out of their pots and plant them in the ground. You may fluke it and they may flower this year or even next, but don't be fooled: They are not happy. Cymbidiums like to have crowded roots — leave them in their pots! Or if you have already taken them out of their pots, dig them back up and repot them. They will thank you for it.
2. When you find an infestation of aphids and scale on your young orchids one day, do not freak out and immediately cover the plants with pyrethrum and then leave them in the sun. This "cure" is much worse than the problem and you will end up with severely burned, if not dead, plants. Wait for a cool, preferably overcast, day and spray **lightly** with Eco Oil. You may have to repeat this treatment in six weeks' time, but that is certainly preferable to killing eight or nine orchids in one moment of frenzy!
3. Do not wait ten years from when you bought your first orchid to join a local orchid club. There is no need to have to learn everything the hard way by trial and error! The club is full of members more than happy to give you hints and help you out with your new hobby. There will probably even be a "New Growers" group already established that has special meetings to assist novice growers.
4. Do not kill your plants with kindness by over watering. Too little water is far better than too much. Too much water causes root rot, which is very difficult to get rid of.
5. Do not throw out the nametags every time you buy a new orchid. You may think you don't care about the parentage of your new plant or that the name is too long to be of any interest to you. Or when you repot your plant you may carelessly throw out the tag with the old potting mix. **Don't do it!!** Once you follow Tip #3 above, you will probably find yourself interested in competing in the club's monthly competition or even in bigger orchid shows. You will have a better chance of winning a prize in the competition if you know what your plant is and are able to put the correct name on the entry form rather than "unknown". Plus you will be able to converse with members of the club without feeling stupid once you know the proper names of your plants!
6. Unless you are rich, do not buy expensive plants when you are just starting out in your orchid hobby as you will probably end up killing them until you learn what conditions in your yard suit what type of orchids. It is very tempting to go into an orchid nursery and buy a gorgeous-looking plant that is in full bloom and think you can keep it growing that well. Don't kid yourself! That orchid was grown by a professional and in optimum conditions in the

nursery's heated or cooled greenhouse, you have more chance of winning the lottery than getting that plant to bloom again in your back yard. Take Tip #3 above and ask someone at your local orchid club for suggestions on orchids best suited for novice growers.

7. If you get really lucky and your cymbidium starts to put out flower spikes that head horizontally along the top of the potting mix towards the edge of the pot instead of growing upwards, **leave the spikes alone!!** Do not try to tie them to wooden stakes so that they grow vertically. These are called "pendulous" spikes for a reason — they like to hang down below the rim of the pot. If you think you can change their mind, they will either break off in your hand or twist around into weird shapes if you even manage to get them attached to a wooden stake in the first place. Of course, not all your cymbidiums will have pendulous spikes. Be patient — wait and see what the spike wants to do before "helping" it.
8. Don't be alarmed when you find yourself becoming obsessed with acquiring more and more orchids. This is a common disease and cannot be cured. Resign yourself to the fact that you will be infected the rest of your life with orchid mania and just get on with it.
9. On a really hot day, don't spend all day on the couch in front of a fan complaining about the temperature. If you do, the next day you will go outside to see how your orchids fared in the heat — and you will soon be searching for a sharp knife with which to slit your wrists. Many of your orchids that could have been protected by either moving them into the shade or into your garage or covering them with a bit of shade cloth will be incredibly sunburned and may take years to recuperate, if ever. You will never forgive yourself if this happens, so get off your backside and make sure it doesn't!!
